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## HIGHLIGHTS

### I. The Institute at May Hall: A Celebration of the 15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

The Institute celebrated its 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary on January 12, 2016. HKU Senior Management Team and over 70 honorable guests shared this momentous occasion with us at our brand-new Lecture Hall. We were honored to have President Professor Peter Mathieson as our officiating guest.

Since its humble establishment in 2001, the Institute has been devoted to promoting cross-boundary, innovative, interdisciplinary research and teaching in the humanities and social sciences. In 15 years, with support from donors, friends and colleagues who believe in our humanistic vision, the Institute has been transformed from “a unit that could easily be carried in a bag” to a global entity that has firmly rooted in HKU and in Asia. “We strive to make HKU and Hong Kong the intellectually vibrant, civil, cosmopolitan place we want it to be; and we will continue to support a community of scholars who are not afraid to think outside the box, who take risks and bridge diverse realms from all directions,” said Prof. Helen F. Siu, Founding Director of the Institute.

During the celebration ceremony, the Institute also announced the establishment of the Hung Leung Hau Ling Distinguished Visiting Professorship in the Humanities and Social Sciences in the Institute. (See also p. 3)

The anniversary celebration also marked the completion of the renovation and restoration project of historic May Hall. Built in 1915, May Hall is one of the oldest structures on HKU campus, notably characterized by its Edwardian style and distinct use of red bricks and white inlays common among British college buildings in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century. In 2011, the University decided to allocate this Grade I historic building to the Institute to provide a physical space for its future development. An earlier phase of renovation took place in 2012. The final phase of restoration of May Hall to its original architectural beauty was completed in end-2015. May Hall has been transformed into a hub for learning, teaching, and academic exchange. It is also emblematic of the humanistic tradition that the Institute works hard to preserve and re-create.



## **II. Establishment of the Hung Leung Hau Ling Distinguished Visiting Professorship in the Humanities and Social Sciences**

The establishment of the Hung Leung Hau Ling Distinguished Visiting Professorship in the Humanities and Social Sciences was officially announced at the 9<sup>th</sup> Inauguration of Endowed Professorships on April 15, 2016.

The Scheme would be supported by a generous HK\$20 million donation from the Hung Hing Ying & Leung Hau Ling Charitable Foundation and Kowloon Investment Company Limited and another HK\$20 million matched by the University. This permanent endowment aims at bringing top academics in the fields of the humanities and social sciences to the University to help nurture and inspire the next generation with humanistic sensibility for charting a cosmopolitan, multi-cultural future. It would provide the impetus to promote the development of path-breaking programs in targeted areas; foster invaluable links with reputable institutions; enhance the University's leadership in the international academic community; and provide a knowledge exchange platform for the Hong Kong community. The Institute will commence the selection of the inaugural Distinguished Visiting Professor soon.

### III. Visits by Distinguished Scholars

In the reporting year, the Institute has hosted some of the top intellectuals in the field by effectively leveraging on schemes offered by Institute and the University to attract scholars of great distinction to visit HKU for a period of time.

**Prof. Helen F. Siu**, Professor of Anthropology, Yale University, returned to the Institute in fall of 2015 and the summer of 2016 as Visiting Research Professor. In addition to conducting field research and mentored students and junior colleagues, she spent most of her time helping Prof. Angela Leung take the Institute to a new stage of development.



**Prof. David Der-wei Wang**, Edward C. Henderson Professor of Chinese and Comparative Literature, Harvard University, and Hung Leung Hau Ling Distinguished Fellow in Humanities, HKU, returned to the University for a second visit in December 2015. This time, he organized a workshop and a forum, engaging colleagues, peers and students alike in rigorous and enlightening debates about the Sinophone discourse and its implications for the study of Hong Kong. The twin events – titled “Sinophone in Hong Kong: Issues and Debates” – draw an enthusiastic response from the HKU and local academic communities. The forum, in particular, was over-subscribed with more than 140 guests and attendees packing the lecture hall to the brim. (See also p. 15 under “Other Conferences and Workshops”)



**Prof. Dorothy Ko**, Professor of History at Barnard College, Columbia University, was the third Visiting Professor supported by the Institutional Enhancement Scheme (p. 17). She visited the Institute in the fall semester of 2015-16. She taught a postgraduate seminar course “Technology, Medicine and Body” that created an inter-active platform for discussion and exchange between HKU students and those from other local universities. She also engaged in a number of academic events, including the delivery of a distinguished lecture entitled “The Female Artisan: Gu Erniang and the Craft of Inkstone-Making in the Early Qing”, participation in our “Meet the Director – Home Video – A Story of Birth” and the “Forum on Research in Gender and Ming-Qing Culture” jointly organized with the History Department of Hong Kong Baptist University.

**Prof. Xiang Biao**, Professor in Social Anthropology, Oxford University, was the fourth Visiting Professor supported by the Institutional Enhancement Scheme. He spent a semester at the Institute from January to May 2016. He offered a postgraduate seminar course “Mobility, Governance and the Anthropological Imagination” at the Institute, mentored postgraduate students, gave well-attended public lectures in the University on migrant communities in Beijing and on new Chinese ethnic policies. Prof. Xiang also participated in the Institute’s Critical Dialogues about China Lecture Series jointly organized with the Faculty of Arts.



## CORE PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

### I. Multi-Year Research Clusters

#### 1. Science, Technology, and Medicine in Asian Societies

Led by Prof. Angela Leung, the cluster organized an international research team working on a project entitled “Making Modernity in East Asia: Technologies of Everyday Life, 19<sup>th</sup>-21<sup>st</sup> Centuries” and submitted a proposal for the Hong Kong Research Grants Council (RGC)-administered Collaborative Research Fund (CRF) in February 2016. In July, the team was invited by RGC to submit a full proposal for the CRF Scheme for final-round selection in November 2016.

The CRF proposal was presented by Prof. Angela Leung, together with Dr. Izumi Nakayama and Dr. Gonçalo Santos, at the first annual meeting of the Society for the History of Technology (SHOT) in Asia, held in Singapore in June 2016. Dr. Santos and Prof. Suzanne Gottschang (Smith College) also organized a double panel on reproduction technologies. Prof. Gottschang is one of the collaborators of the CRF project.

In the reporting year, the cluster continued to organize and host a series of workshops and lectures on health, science, technologies study with speakers and participants from around the global. The workshop on “Moral Foods: ‘Good’ and ‘Bad’ Foods in the Construction of Modern Asian Health Regimes” in January 2016, was a book project meeting following up on the successful International Conference on “Food and Health” held in end-2014. A diverse group of scholars from the United

Kingdom, the United States, India, Taiwan, Japan, and Hong Kong gathered to examine the moral values and meanings of food in the construction of modern health regimes and identities in Asia from roughly the 19<sup>th</sup> century to the present (see [Appendix I](#) for the program). A book volume co-edited by Prof. Angela Leung and Prof. Melissa Caldwell of UCSC is under preparation at present.



The Science, Technology and Medicine (STM) Working Group presented two lectures at the "Science, Technology, and Medicine in Societies Colloquium Series". Prof. Hallam Stevens of Nanyang Technological University gave a presentation on "Starting-up Biology: BGI and the Making of life in Shenzhen" in October 2015. Following this lecture, another on "Chao Yuen Ren and the Modern Soundscape of Republican China (1912-1937)" was given by Prof. Yeang Chen-Pang of University of Toronto in June 2016. These lectures highlighted the research interests of the cluster and strengthened the Institute's wide global network.

To train the next generation of scholars, the Institute continued its collaboration with the Harvard Yenching Institute, Peking University and Nankai University on the two-year training program "Humanities, Social Sciences and Medicine in East Asia: Interdisciplinary Approaches". Focused on the theme "Medical Knowledge in Practice, Medical Practice as Knowledge", the second training workshop was held in Tianjin in August 2016. (See p. 10)

## 2. Hubs, Mobilities and the Asian Urban

Led by Profs. Helen F. Siu and Richard Wong, the cluster has organized activities aimed at research training on Inter-Asian urbanity for postgraduate students and junior scholars. Supported by funds



provided by the Lee Hysan Foundation for the Institute's teaching enhancement scheme, Prof. Xiang Biao (Anthropology, Oxford University) spent a semester at the Institute from January to May 2016. He taught a postgraduate seminar course in the Institute, mentored students, and gave well-attended public lectures and seminars. During his stay, he also conducted ethnographic fieldwork on Chinese institutions facilitating Arabic and African trading communities in Yiwu, Zhejiang. Although he has returned to Oxford, Prof. Xiang continues working with Prof. Siu and the cluster team.

Prof. Timothy Oakes (Human Geography, University of Colorado Boulder) accepted the invitation from the cluster to spend a semester at the Institute, which will be partially supported by the Institutional Enhancement Scheme funded by the Lee Hysan Foundation. Prof. Oakes will come in the spring semester of 2017. During his visit, he will offer a seminar course entitled "China's Urban Geographies" to postgraduate students from diverse disciplines, mentor students and young colleagues, and engage in the cluster's events.

The cluster has also planned a third "Asia Inside Out" workshop focusing on peoples and institutions of Asian connectedness. 15 scholars from Hong Kong, the United Kingdom, the United States, and around the world will give papers and participate in the workshop and field trip to Hanoi in January 2017, a city with many layers of history of inter-Asian trade over land and sea. A volume from this workshop "Asia Inside Out: Mobile Peoples" is contracted for publication with Harvard University Press.

### 3. Rethinking Spirituality and Religion in Asia

Led by Dr. David A. Palmer, the cluster has continued to contribute to nurturing young scholars and students at HKU. Dr. Palmer held a bi-weekly postgraduate seminar on anthropological and sociological approaches to Chinese religious traditions in the context of modern constructions of the self, spirituality and globalization. Postgraduate students, visiting students and postdoctoral fellows regularly attended the seminar. A brand-new lecture series "Spirituality, Religion and Society" was also launched with the inaugural session by Dr. Chen Na of Fudan University in April 2016.



One of the regular participants in the cluster's events is Dr. An Wei, a new Postdoctoral Fellow supported by the donation from NeoUnion Educational Scientific and Cultural Foundation to the Institute. Dr. An's research focus is on religion in contemporary Chinese literature.

The cluster made significant achievements on collaborations in the reporting year. The proposal “Building a Trans-Asia Collaborative Network in Researching and Teaching Religion and Society in Asia: China-India-Indonesia” submitted to the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia has been awarded a total of US\$75,000. Together with its partners - National University of Singapore, Asian Centre for Cross-Cultural Studies, Chennai, and Indonesian Consortium for Religious Studies, the cluster shall organize a series of summer workshops in 2017, 2018 and 2019. A total US\$25,000 will be allocated to the Institute for the organization of the inaugural workshop in 2017.

The cluster also began an international collaboration with the Institute for Ethnology of the University of Münster, Germany, on the “Digital Library of the Lanten Textual Heritage”, which is a British Library-sponsored project. The project will digitise 412 Chinese manuscripts as well as recordings and audio-visual documentations of their use by Lanten priests in various ritual contexts. A selection of the manuscripts will be converted into typed Chinese script and published in a book series on local Daoist ritual traditions at Wenfeng Publishers in Taiwan, making them accessible for academic research and publication.

## **II. Global and Multi-Year Partnerships on Research Training**

As in previous years, the Institute continued to develop and expand its network of international institutional partners to further collaborative efforts on research and learning.

### **1. Social Science Research Council and National University of Singapore**

The InterAsia Initiatives between the Institute, the Social Science Research Council (SSRC), the National University of Singapore (NUS), Yale University and Göttingen University is into its seventh



year. The major event of this partnership is the “InterAsian Connections” (IAC) conference series. The fifth conference was successfully hosted by the Seoul National University Asia Centre from April 27 to 30, 2016.

The conference comprised 10 concurrent, closed director-led workshops and public plenaries. Prof. Lisa Yoneyama (University of Toronto) was invited to give a keynote speech on “National Histories and the Cold War: Transpacific Critique”. Panelists on the plenaries included senior scholars from the core partners of the Initiatives – Profs. Helen F. Siu, Angela Leung, K. Sivaramakrish (Yale), Prasenjit Duara (Duke), Engseng Ho (Duke), and Dr. Seteney Shami (SSRC). Details of the program is at [Appendix II](#).

During the conference period, a brainstorming workshop on environmental humanities involved Prof. Siu, Prof. Leung, and Ms. Dorothy Tang (Architecture, HKU) was held, and the theme will be highlighted in the next IAC conference to be held in Vietnam.

## 2. The Association for Asian Studies

The Institute's involvement in the organization of the "Asia in Motion" conference series with the Association for Asian Studies (AAS), National University of Singapore, Academia Sinica and Doshisha University continued in the reporting year. Following the success of the second conference hosted by Academia Sinica in 2015, the third conference "Asia in Motion: Horizons of Hope" was hosted by Doshisha University in Kyoto in June 2016. Prof. Heonik Kwon of Cambridge University gave a keynote speech on "Horizons of Hope Beyond the Cold War". Prof. Helen F. Siu, Dr. Lawrence Zhang and Dr. Zhang Xueqian of the Institute participated in the conference.

## 3. Harvard-Yenching Institute, Peking University and Nankai University

The "Humanities, Social Sciences and Medicine in East Asia" partnership between the Institute, Harvard-Yenching Institute, Peking University, and Nankai University is into its second year. This year's training workshop was hosted by Key Research Institute of Social History of China, Nankai University in Tianjin from August 1 to 8, 2016. The 2016 workshop program is in [Appendix III](#).

The organizing committee selected 19 out of 47 applicants to participate in the 8-day workshop entitled "Medical Knowledge in Practice, Medical Practice". These 19 trainees from Hong Kong, China and around the world were engaged in lectures, group discussions, fieldwork and project work guided by top medical humanities scholars Professors



Shigehisa Kuriyama (Harvard University), Angela Leung (HKU), Yu Xinzhong (Nankai University), Zhang Daqing (Peking University), with invited speakers Professors Gianna Pomata and Jeremy Greene (both from Johns Hopkins University). Two HKU scholars Dr. Izumi Nakayama (HKIHSS) and Dr. Daniel Trambaiolo (Japanese Studies) participated in the program as mentors. Mr. Liu Xiaomeng, PhD student in the Institute, attended as instructor.

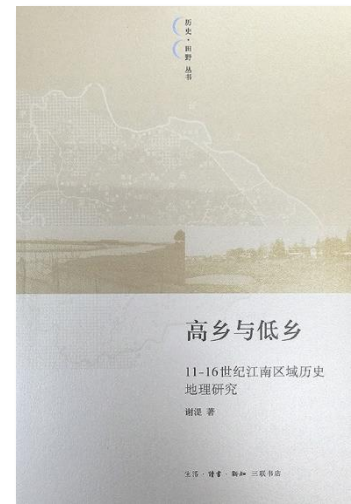
At the conclusion of the program, a small number of outstanding individuals will be selected to spend a year in residency as visiting scholar at the Harvard-Yenching Institute.

#### 4. Yale University

As a vital institutional partner, Yale University has consistently provided invaluable support to the Institute since its establishment in 2001. Yale Professor of Anthropology, Prof. Helen F. Siu paid regular visits to the Institute as Visiting Research Professor in the reporting year. Prof. Siu has organized the resources to nurture young talents and mentor students, and continued her role as co-director of the “Hubs, Mobilities and the Asian Urban” cluster (see also p. 6).

#### 5. Sun Yat-sen University

Another of our longstanding partnerships is with the Sun Yat-sen University (SYSU) in Guangzhou, and in particular, its History Department and the Centre for Historical Anthropology. For over a decade, we have worked together to proceed the acclaimed *Journal of History and Anthropology* 《歷史人類學刊》, the *History in the Field* 《歷史・田野叢書》 monograph series, the Historical Anthropology Lecture Series (歷史人類學講座系列), and the Advanced Summer Training Workshop on Historical Anthropology (歷史人類學高級研修班). The memorandum of cooperation for the Journal and Workshop projects concluded in April 2015. The *History in the Field* series continued with the launch of another book 《高鄉與低鄉：11-16世紀江南區域歷史地理研究》 by Dr. Xie Shi in the fall of 2015.



### III. Lectures, Seminars, Workshops and Conferences

Making up another vital aspect of the Institute's work are the regular seminars and lecture where renowned intellectuals, colleagues and visiting scholars share their expertise, showcase their work and engage in in-depth discussions with their peers and students. #### 5. Other Conferences and Workshops

The Institute had worked with different partners to organize conferences and workshops in 2015-16.

##### **A Workshop-cum-Forum on Sinophone Hong Kong: Issues and Debates (December 2015)**

Prof. David Der-wei Wang, Edward C. Henderson Professor of Chinese and Comparative Literature at Harvard University, made his follow up visit to the University as Hung Leung Hau Ling Distinguished Visiting Fellow in Humanities in December 2015. Coinciding with his visit, international and regional scholars gathered together at the Institute to examine the implications of Sinophone studies in a special workshop and forum on “Sinophone Hong Kong: Issues and Debates”.

Prof. Wang delivered one of the two lectures slated at the forum. His “Sailing to the Sinophone World: On the Geopoetics of Postcolonialism and Postloyalism” addressed Sinophone Chinese literary studies in three aspects and proposed that a Sinophone imaginary provides a critical interface through which to rethink the configuration of (Chinese) national literature via à vis world literature. Prof. Wang later joined fellow speaker Prof. Shih Shu-mei (School of Chinese, HKU), panel moderator Prof. Angela Leung, and commentators Prof. Leonard Kwok Kou Chan (the then HKIE) and Prof. Lo Kwai Cheung (HKBU) for a lively and passionate hour-long discussion with audience, on a wide range of topics and controversial issues in Sinophone literature, including the legacy of the Umbrella Movement. ### Public Lecture Series of Chinese Family Business Studies (December 2015)

Spearheaded by Honorary Professors Wong Siu Lun and Victor Zheng, the Public Lecture Series of Chinese Family Business Studies is part of a larger project investigating the evolution of Chinese business families and the ways they cope with challenges posed by rapidly changing operating environments. A total of 10 speakers gave presentations at this year's series with focus on "Chinese Financial Family: Exploration, Consolidation and Innovation". Each presenter shared a case study about a prominent family business in the region. This series was co-organized by the Institute, the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) and the Hong Kong Museum of History. Program details are in [Appendix V](#).



## IV. Institutional Development

### 1. Institutional Enhancement Scheme

#### Visiting Professors

With the Institutional Enhancement Scheme funded by Lee Hysan Foundation, the Institute hosted the visits of two distinguished scholars in 2015-16: **Prof. Dorothy Ko**, Professor of History at Barnard College, Columbia University, and **Prof. Xiang Biao**, Professor in Social Anthropology, Oxford University. They not only taught courses at the Institute and the University, but also mentored our postgraduate students, young researchers and scholars, and participated in the “Hubs and Mobilities and the Asian Urban” cluster’s planning and activities. Another distinguished scholar, **Prof. Timothy Oakes** (Geography, University of Colorado Boulder), has accepted our invitation to spend a semester at the Institute in spring 2017. Prof. Oakes is a renowned cultural geographer of China. His research lies at the juncture of human geography, contemporary China studies and critical tourism studies. During his visit, Prof. Oakes will teach a postgraduate seminar course on “China’s Urban Geographies”. In addition to his teaching responsibilities, he will give a public lecture and engage with “Hubs, Mobilities and the Asian Urban” cluster.

#### Lee Hysan-HKIHSS Fellowship

The Lee Hysan-HKIHSS Fellowship, a fellowship scheme established under the Institutional Enhancement Scheme, aims to support students in the Institute and the University to conduct overseas academic exchange. Following the return of the first two recipients (Mr. Peter Tam and Ms. Ryan Xie, MPhil, HKIHSS) of the fellowship, three PhD students – Ms. Yan Xia, Mr. Jules Liu, and Mr. Liu Xiaomeng – were selected to conduct exchange abroad:



**Ms. Yan Xia** (PhD student in Sociology) commenced her 5-month exchange under the mentorship of Prof. Gary Gereffi at Duke University in January 2016. She brought back with her a new framework of her thesis and plans to continue her data collection in Shenzhen in the fall semester of 2016 while preparing presentations of ideas and framework developed during her exchange at Duke next year at a couple of international conferences.



**Mr. Jules Liu** (PhD student in Sociology) and **Mr. Liu Xiaomeng** (PhD student in HKIHSS) have been selected the next fellowship recipients. Mr. Jules Liu will be spending 11 months under the mentorship of Prof. Sebastian Veg at the Centre for the Study of Modern and Contemporary China, the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales, in France from October 2016. Mr. Liu Xiaomeng will commence his 5-month exchange program at the Centre for Science and Society, Columbia University from January 2017. He will be under the mentorship of Prof. Pamela Smith.



## 2. Postgraduate Programs

### New MPhil Students

The coming 2016-17 academic year marks the arrival of a new group of postgraduate students to the Institute.

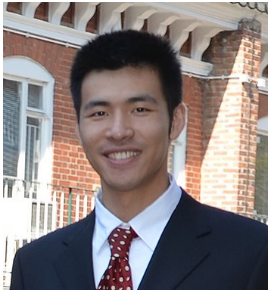

## VI. Further Integration with the University



The Institute has successfully established a joint tenure-track Assistant Professor position in China Studies with the Faculty of Arts. After a global search, the joint search committee selected **Dr. Li Ji**, formerly a Postdoctoral Fellow (2011-12) and a Research Assistant Professor (2012-2015) in the Institute. During the recruitment exercise, the short-listed candidate **Dr. Christine Luk**, impressed the committee. The Institute and the Faculty thus decided to create a joint Postdoctoral position for Dr. Luk. With these shared positions, collaborations between the Institute and the Faculty of Arts is further strengthened and research synergies enhanced.

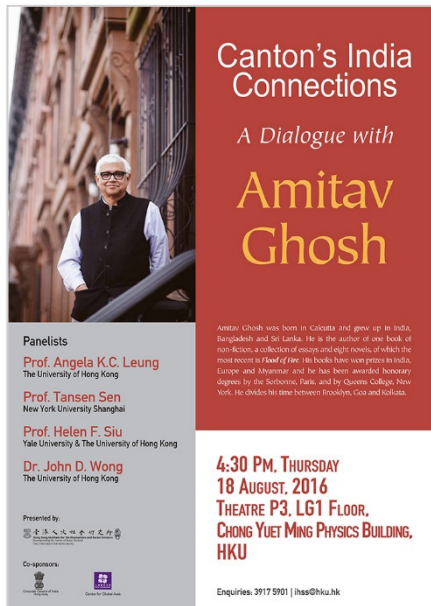

## 2. Contemporary Chinese Documentary Series

Moving into its 11<sup>th</sup> year, the **Contemporary Chinese Documentary Series** has served as a platform to showcase films highlighting socio-economic, political and cultural issues in Greater China. The screenings have regularly received praise and are consistently well-received by colleagues and students alike. Two films were presented in the 2015-16 season:

**Home Video - A Story of Birth** (家庭錄像——一個關於生育的故事), directed by Wang Qiong (王瓊), produced by Jian Yi (簡藝), November 20, 2015.

**Listen to Macau** (聆聽澳門街), directed by Ding Cheng (丁澄), March 18, 2016.

### 3. Preserving the History of the Southern District

Dr. Wong Wai Ling (Research Officer) has continued her involvement in the project of documenting and sharing the history of the fishing communities in the Southern District. The project is jointly run by the Institute and the University's Centre of Development and Resources for Students (CEDARS) and as part of the We Are With You (WAY) Project funded by the Chow Tai Fook Charity Foundation. In the reporting year, the project focused on sharing the research outcomes from the oral history interviews with the fishermen in Aberdeen and Stanley through a series of activities, including exhibition, guided tours, public talks and radio programs, etc. HKU students recruited under the oral history project played a significant role in making these activities successful.
